

APA Quick Guide (7th ed.)

A book by a single author:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). *Title*. Publisher.

Example:

Berne, E. (2004). *Games people play: The psychology of human relationships*. Ballantine Books.

A chapter in an edited book:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of chapter. In Editor's First Initial Last Name & Editor's First Initial Last Name (Eds.), *Title of book* (Number ed., pp. page numbers). Publisher.

Example:

Hugo, H. S. (2005). Cancer. In L.M. Tierney, S. J. McPhee, & M. A. Papadakis (Eds.), *Current medical diagnosis & treatment* (44th ed., pp.1589-1651). McGraw Hill.

A print periodical article without a DOI (Digital Object Identifier):

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of article. *Title of Periodical*, Volume(Issue), Page Numbers.

Example:

Dobson, L. (2006, July/August). What's your humor style? *Psychology Today*, 39(4), 74-77.

A print periodical article with a DOI:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of article. *Title of Periodical*, Volume(Issue), Page Numbers. DOI

Example:

Ferretti, R.P., Lewis, W. E. & Andrews-Weckerly, S. (2009, August). Do goals affect the structure of students' argumentative writing strategies? *Journal of Educational Psychology*, 101, 577-589.

A periodical article from the web without a DOI:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of article. *Title of Periodical*, Volume(Issue).

<http://www.nameofwebsite.com/page>

Example:

Cloud, J. (2009, January 19). Minds on the edge. *Time*, 173. <http://www.time.com/time>

An online journal article without DOI

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of article. *Title of Journal, Volume(Issue)*. Page Numbers. <http://www.website.org/page>

Example:

Lewis, M., Edwards, A. & Burton, M. (2009). Coping with retirement: Well-being, health, and religion. *Journal of Psychology*, 143, 427-448. <http://www.hedref.org/pubs/jrl/about.htm>

An online journal article with a DOI:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of article. *Title of Journal, Volume(Issue)*, Page Numbers. DOI

Example:

Dallaire, D.H., & Weintraub, M. (2005, December). Predicting children's separation anxiety at age 6: The contributions of infant-mother attachment security, and maternal sensitivity, and maternal separation anxiety. *Attachment & Human Development*, 7, 393-408. <https://doi.org/10.1080/14616730500365894>

A webpage on a website:

Author's Last Name, First Initial. (Publication date). Title of webpage. Website sponsor name.
<http://www.website.com>

Example:

Hitti, M. (2003). Arthritis rising: Are you at risk?. WebMD. <http://www.webmd.com>

An online video (ex. YouTube):

Author's Last Name, First Initial. [Screen name]. (Publication/Posting date). Title of video [Video]. YouTube.
Retrieved date (if relevant) from <http://www.website.com>

Example:

Breslin, J. (2009, November 9). Lecture 1: What is electrical engineering? [Video]. YouTube. Retrieved December 15, 2011 from <https://youtube/com/watch?v=6c3iW-FCkAI>

Tips for In-Text Citation:

APA uses the author-date method of citing references within the text of the paper. See the APA manual or the Tutoring Center's full handout for more information.

Example: Onega (2006) used old family photographs to engage elderly patients...

OR

In a recent study of elderly patients (Onega, 2006), old family photographs...
